

Claiming back money from wills, estates and trust funds

If the legal adviser is the only <u>executor</u>

What we need from you

We will need

- copies of the most recent estate accounts
- copies of any bills the legal adviser may have delivered
- a copy of the will or trust deed
- a copy of the grant of <u>probate [https://indemnity.sra.org.uk/consumers/using-solicitor/legal-jargon-explained#probate]</u> or letters of administration, and
- copies of any ledger sheets the legal adviser kept—you can obtain
 this from the agent we asked to close the firm: if they do not have
 it, please <u>contact us [https://indemnity.sra.org.uk/contact-us]</u>, as we may be
 storing it.

What if the estate accounts are out of date, challenged or missing?

You will need to prepare a cash statement. This is because we need to know the actual amount for which the legal adviser has failed to account to you.

You must also send us supporting <u>evidence</u> [https://indemnity.sra.org.uk/consumers/using-solicitor/legal-jargon-explained#evidence], such as

Solicitors Regulation Authority

- a letter from the person making the payment to the legal adviser, or
 the legal adviser's account slip to show they have received the money.
